MAJOR THEMES IN COMPARATIVE ANALYSIS

This course is a graduate seminar in comparative politics. It aims to help provide students with the conceptual, theoretical, and analytical tools necessary for comparative research. It takes the form of a "great books" course that focuses on outstanding recently published texts. The authors of the books we are reading will be joining us for discussions.

Our focus will not only be on critiquing and discussing the books with the authors, but also on using our conversations with them to learn how to do research. Topics will include how they formulated their research questions, developed their concepts and measures, grappled with causal inference, and dealt with methodological challenges. Students will also be encouraged to discuss their own research with our guest authors, including the challenges of working in the age of Covid.
